Francis D. Alvarez, S.J., finished his STL at Boston College School of Theology and Ministry and worked under the direction of the late Fr. Daniel Harrington, S.J. Fr. Ramon L. Bautista, S.J., earned his Licentiate in Sacred Theology (STL) from the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley and a PhD in Spirituality from Heythrop College, University of London. He was Spiritual Director at San Jose Seminary, Quezon City and at St. John Vianney Theological Seminary, Cagayan de Oro for a number of years. He was also Novice Master of the Philippine Jesuit Province for twelve years, and is now Assistant Tertian Director of the Asia Pacific Jesuit Assistancy. Among his published works are *Hearts Burning: The Consciousness Examen as an Authentic Ignatian Formation in Discerning Love* (Makati: Bookmark, 1990); *Ignatian Prayer and Ignatian Discernment: A Critical Evaluation of Recent Literature in English on Two Key Aspects of the Spiritual Exercises of Ignatius of Loyola as a School of Love* (London: Heythrop College, 1997); *A Way to the Desert: 101 Questions and Answers on Retreat, Prayer and Discernment: The Ignatian Way* (Makati: St. Paul’s Publication, 2001); *Wood for the Fire* (Makati: St. Paul’s Publication, 2006); and *Schooled by the Spirit: A Prayer Companion to Ignatian Spirituality* (Quezon City: Jesuit Communications, 2009).

Sr. Ma. Anicia B. Co, R.V.M., is a member of the Congregation of the Religious of the Virgin Mary. She completed AB Philosophy at the University of Santo Tomas, Manila and MA Theological Studies at Maryhill School of Theology, Quezon City. After earning her STL, STD, and PhD degrees from the Catholic

University of Leuven, Belgium, she returned to Manila and taught Scriptures from 1991 to 2001 in different schools of theology and institutes of formation. Elected as a member of the General Council of her Congregation in 2001, she served from 2006 to 2011 as General Consultor and concurrently as chair of the RVM Education Ministry, President of the RVM EAP, and President of St. Mary's College, Quezon City. She is now teaching Scriptures at the Institute of Formation and Religious Studies, Institute for Consecrated Life in Asia, St. Vincent School of Theology, St. John Vianney Theological Seminary, and Loyola School of Theology. She gives seminars and talks on the Bible, spirituality, women, and Mariology. She has written some articles, published a book entitled *Mother Ignacia del Espiritu Santo (1663–1748): A Lamp to our Path* (RVM: MICS, 1998), and translated Pope John Paul II's *Crossing the Threshold of Hope* into Filipino (*Pagtawid sa Bungad ng Pag-asa* [Paulines, 1994]).

Michael Paul Gallagher, S.J., obtained his doctorate in theology from Queen's University, Belfast. Through his contact with students at the University College, Dublin, where he taught English and American literature for twenty years, he became interested in the main issues of faith and unbelief, culture and spirituality. He published his first book, *Help my Unbelief* (Chicago: Loyola University Press, 1988). Moving to Rome, he became a professor of fundamental theology at the Pontifical Gregorian University, where he served as dean of the theology faculty from 2005 to 2008. His courses were on the topics of unbelief and culture, the relationship between theology and imagination, the history of thinking on the act of faith, Newman, and Bernard Lonergan. He also worked on the Pontifical Council for Dialogue with Non-Believers and the Pontifical Council for Culture. Among his published works are: *What Are They Saying about Unbelief?* (1995); *The Human Poetry of Faith* (2003); *Clashing Symbols: An Introduction to Faith and Culture* (2004); and *Faith Maps: Ten Religious Explorers from Newman to Joseph Ratzinger* (2010). Since September 2009, he has served as Rector of the

Collegio Bellarmino, a Jesuit community of post-graduate students in Rome.

Sr. Helen R. Graham, M.M., was born in 1937 in Brooklyn, New York and entered the Maryknoll Sisters in 1956. She was assigned to the Philippines in 1967 and worked first in Datu Piang, Cotabato, before joining the faculties of the Sisters Formation Institute (now Institute of Formation and Religious Studies [IFRS]) and Maryknoll (now Miriam) College in 1968. She continues to be a member of the IFRS faculty. She received a Master of Arts in Theology from the Ateneo de Manila University (1971), a Masters in Sacred Theology from the Jesuit School at Berkeley, CA (1983), and a PhD in Theology from the Ateneo de Manila (1995). She has been a member of the Catholic Biblical Association of the Philippines (CBAP) since its inception in 1999 to the present and was a member of the Board of Trustees of the CBAP (2003–2009; 2010–2011). She is the author of *There Shall Be No Poor Among You: Essays in Lukan Theology* (1978); *You Shall Be Handed Over: The Persecution Prediction in Mark 13:9–13* (1987); “*Sing O Barren One ...*” and other Essays on Biblical Themes (2007); and more than fifty articles. She also edited, with Breda Noonan, S.S.C., *How Long: Prison Reflections of Karl Gaspar* (1985).

Carmen Valdés, PhD, is adjunct professor of Theology at Loyola School of Theology and Ateneo de Manila University, Philippines. She obtained a Master’s Degree in Educational Management from De La Salle University Manila, a Master’s Degree in Theology from University of San Francisco, and a Doctorate in Philosophy from GTU/UC Berkeley, California. She held a professorial chair at LST and was one of the first two recipients of the *International Marie Eugenie Award* at the Sala Nervi in the Vatican, Rome. Her areas of expertise are in spirituality, education, and the facilitation of leadership training programs. Her professional experience ranges from being a vice president of human resources at Steelcase/Metro, HR director at *The Gap* in San Francisco, director at Ayala Corporation in Manila,

and Marketing Director at the Cultural Center of the Philippines to former Dean of Assumption College Marie Eugenie School of Innovative Learning and Creative Director of METTA. She has been on the lecture circuit for leadership development in Southeast Asia, California, and the Philippines. Her forté is in the field of spirituality, life coaching of adults and teenagers, and executive coaching for corporate professionals. She has published three music CDs of her personal compositions and has an unpublished recording called the TEMPO Series for movement and dance.
