Rosa Maria Alonso i Terme is currently Visiting Professor at the University of the Philippines School of Economics. His second book, *I Am Because We Are: Reflections on Love, Relationships and Life* (ADMU Press, 2010), was a finalist in the 2010 Catholic Mass Media Awards (CMMA) Cardinal Sin Book Awards, spirituality category. His third book, *Reimagining the Sacred: A Fresh Approach to Prayer, Liturgy and the Sacraments* (Claretian Publications, 2012), was likewise a finalist in the 2013 CMMA Cardinal Sin Book Awards, liturgy category.

Norlan H. Julia, S.J., obtained his Bachelor's degree in Sacred Theology from Loyola School of Theology, Quezon City, Philippines, and Masters in Theological Studies from Ateneo de Manila University. After ordination to the presbyterate in 2005, he was theology professor and formator at St. John Vianney Theological Seminary in Cagayan de Oro City. From 2009–2013, he took up doctoral studies in Heythrop College, London. After earning his doctorate and completing his Jesuit formation in 2014, he has been reassigned to St. John Vianney Theological Seminary where he is currently teaching fundamental and systematic theology.
